Aleksandriya. Roman ob Aleksandre Makedonskom po russkoi rukopisi XV veka (Alexandria. The Romance on Alexander of Macedonia after a Russian Manuscript from the 15th cent.). Moscow, 1965, 269 pp.

The book consists of the publication of the text by Ya. S. Lurie and O. V. Tvorogov, a translation into modern Russian and the appendices, among which a fundamental position is held by the articles: *The Medieval Romance on Alexander of Macedonia in the Russian Literature of the 15th cent.* (Ya. S. Lurie), *The Stylistic Peculiarities of the Romance on Alexander of Macedonia* (O. V. Tvorogov), *A Paleographical Survey* (Ya. S. Lurie) and by an ample commentary (M. N. Botvinnik and Ya. S. Lurie). The book is provided with indexes.

An obituary of an outstanding Soviet investigator of antiquity, Ya. S. Lurie (1891—1964). This scholar, whose scientific interests were very wide, left over two hundred works on the most varied problems, including studies in papyrology and epigraphy. The obituary is provided with a complete bibliography of the works of Ya. S. Lurie compiled by I. D. Amusin. Many of these works are written in foreign languages or have been translated.

I. B. Brashinskii. *Afiny i Severnoye Prichernomor'e v VI—II vv. do n.e.* (Athens and the Northern Black Sea Coast in the 6th to 2nd cent. B.C.) Moscow, 1963, 176 pp.

On pp. 161—163 the author deals with the problem of commercial competition between Bosphorus and Egypt as well as with the letter of Apollonius to Zenon on the occasion of an embassy of Pairisades II.
